15:00- 15:45	Presentation of the photo exhibition "Migrant Health Along the Balkans Route"	Seija Tyrninoksa, Deputy Regional Director for Europe, IFRC (facilitator), Ljubomir Miladinovic, Secretary General, Red Cross of Serbia, Norwegian Red Cross (TBC), and Victor Lacken, photographer of the exhibition	The main objective of this presentation is to highlight Red Cross work on migrant health in three Balkan countries, i.e. Bosnia and Herzegovina, North Macedonia and Serbia, to draw attention to the challenges faced by migrants when trying to access health care on the western Balkans migratory route, to demonstrate good examples of health and care support provided by State health authorities, to advocate for long-term solutions to uphold the right of migrants to access national health-care systems, to provide high visibility and advocacy to a wide audience of stakeholders, including the international community, State and non-State actors, the general public and donors, and to advocate for migrant health at the RCRC statutory meetings in Geneva. The talk will start downstairs, and then Victor will walk people up to the exhibition and describe the photos and the people he met.
15:45- 16:30	150+ years of Movement history at your fingertips: Digitizing the statutory meetings documentation	Brigitte Troyon, Head of Archives and Information Management Division, and Charlotte Mohr, Librarian	The "power of humanity" is well reflected in the more than 150 years of history of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement and the development of international humanitarian law recorded in the proceedings and documents of the statutory meetings. These records are fundamental and provide an indispensable compass to delegates who only attend

the statutory meetings once or twice. It is a lifetime experience that can be daunting without precise knowledge of the past contributions of the National Society or government they represent. With this in mind, the ICRC Library conceived a research guide that serves as an entry point into the newly digitized documentation of the Red Cross and Red Crescent statutory meetings.

10:30- 11:15	Presentation of the book <i>Mission of Mercy</i>	Belarus Red Cross and Belarus government	The book entitled <i>Mission of Mercy</i> was released in Minsk (Belarus) at the end of May 2019. The book presents the history of the Red Cross in Belarus, illustrated by original postcards and photographs from the late nineteenth century to 1939. The book comprises five thematic sections on the work of the Red Cross before World War I, during the Great War (1914–1918), during the establishment of the Belarusian Soviet Socialist Republic (BSSR) and in Eastern and Western Belarus in the period from 1920 to 1930. The author of the book, Mr Vladimir Lihodedov, is a historian and collector, laureate of the Belarus National Award For Spiritual Revival and the author of more than 20 books. The book was prepared and published with the assistance of the Belarus Red Cross and the Ministry of Information of the Republic of Belarus.
